PUBLIC HEARING

The auditorium is wheelchair accessible. At the hearing, any person attending may present statements or arguments orally or in writing relevant to the proposed action described in the Informative Digest/Policy Statement Overview section below. DGS requests but does not require that persons who offer oral comments at the hearing also submit a written copy of their testimony at the hearing.

PUBLIC COMMENT PERIOD

Any interested person, or his or her authorized representative, may submit written comments relevant to the proposed regulatory action to DGS. AUTHORITY AND REFERENCE

Rulemaking authority is granted DGS by Government Code (GC) Sections 14600, 14615, 14837(d), 14839, 14839.1 and 14843, in reference to the Small Business Procurement and Contract Act (Act), effecting regulations found in California Code of Regulations (CCR), Title 2, Division 2, Chapter 3, Subchapter 8, Sections 1896-1896.22.

INFORMATIVE DIGEST/POLICY STATEMENT OVERVIEW

The purpose of this action is the amendment of existing regulations to incorporate Senate Bill 605 (Statutes of 2017, Chapter 673, Sections 3 & 4), amending GC Sections 14837 and 14838.

- Specifically, this law: (1) Created a new category of Small Business for the purpose of public works contract preferences; and (2) Adjusted upward existing eligibility size standards for the average annual gross receipts for other small businesses and microbusinesses certified by the Department of General Services. This triggers adjustment in existing SB rules Title 2, §§ 1896.4, 1896.12 and 1896.17 together with adoption of rule 1896.13 in accordance with Administrative Procedure Act necessity, clarity, consistency and nonduplication principles.
- According to the legislative author, the small business definition used in the Small Business Procurement and Contract Act prior to SB 605's passage was limiting relatively small businesses in the public works arena from being considered a small business for state contracting purposes.

Anticipated Benefits and Objectives of the Proposed Regulation:

The general non-monetary benefits anticipated by the proposed adoption include:

- Promotion of the Small Business for the purpose of public works opportunity to a wider audience, in accordance with legislative intent;

- The Department maintains that this proposed regulation is necessary and essential for the administrative success of the program expansion, as legislatively mandated. Adoption ensures stakeholder awareness of Small Business for the purpose of public works contracting opportunities, and where applicable, affords the affected public regulatory consistency.
- Determination of Inconsistency/Incompatibility with Existing Regulations: As these are the only regulations included in Title 2 of the CCR governing and authorizing SB Public Works, inconsistencies or incompatibilities with regulations adopted by other state agencies are not likely to exist. As Federal rules affecting veterans and small business in Titles 13 and 38 of the Code of Federal Regulations (CFR) and in the Federal Acquisition Regulations (FAR) apply exclusively to the federal government and inasmuch the DVBE CCR rules are applicable only to a California-specific program, unsupported by Federal funding, CFR/FAR and CCR inconsistencies or incompatibilities do not exist.

RESULTS OF THE ECONOMIC IMPACT ANALYSIS-ASSESSMENT

- The Creation or Elimination of Jobs within the State of California: There is no expectation of significant job creation or job elimination.
- The Creation of New Businesses or the Elimination of Existing Businesses within the State of California: These rules are intended to support widened opportunities for existing enterprises, as opposed to creating or eliminating existing businesses.
- The Expansion of Businesses Currently Doing Business within the State of California: A wide variety of jobs and occupations integral to the services and products that may be secured or acquired under public sector construction contracts stand to benefit from the expansion of this program. The declaration of findings for SB 605 states expressly that the position of small business can be substantially improved by expanding the definition of a small business, for certification purposes, that would allow these businesses to amass the capital and expertise necessary to compete for state work. Such expansion also benefits the state departments and consumers by encouraging a widening of the number of small business enterprise suppliers for procurements, thereby fostering competition among the suppliers and promoting economic

efficiency in the process. It is understood that the state creates greater value by awarding contracts to SBs and DVBEs over large businesses and on average produces new economic activity more than if awarding the contracts to large businesses alone.

SIGNIFICANT, STATEWIDE ADVERSE ECONOMIC IMPACT ON BUSINESS

The Department finds that the proposed regulations will not have a significant, statewide adverse economic impact directly affecting business, including the ability of California businesses to compete with businesses in other states (Gov. Code Section 11346.5(a)(8)).

EFFECT ON SMALL BUSINESS

The long-term economic viability of this state depends substantially upon the ability of small businesses to be successful, according to the Legislature's adopted findings and declarations. The anticipated benefits of this rulemaking are that stakeholders have suitable regulations regarding certification program expansion. It reduces subjective interpretation of law, promotes transparency and should reduce unnecessary costs associated with program administration. Overall, this amounts to positive improvement in the welfare of all those small businesses seeking contracting opportunities with the state and other local governmental entities. Therefore, these rules do and will continue to afford small businesses an important opportunity to participate in free enterprise, in satisfaction of Legislative intent.

COST IMPACTS ON REPRESENTATIVE PRIVATE PERSONS

The range of direct or ongoing costs that a representative private person or business will necessarily incur in reasonable compliance are negligible and wholly consistent with those normally associated with usual and ordinary business activity and, more importantly, are consistent with the voluntary nature of the program in question.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that the Fair Political Practices Commission, pursuant to the authority vested in it by Sections 82011, 87303, and 87304 of the Government Code to review proposed conflict-of-interest codes, will review the proposed/amended conflict-of-interest codes of the following:

CONFLICT-OF-INTEREST CODES

AMENDMENT

MULTI-COUNTY: Victor Valley Community College District

A written comment period has been established commencing on July 20, 2018, and closing on September 3, 2018. Written comments should be directed to the Fair Political Practices Commission, Attention Sasha Linker, 1102 Q Street, Suite 3000, Sacramento, California 95811.

At the end of the 45-day comment period, the proposed conflict-of-interest code(s) will be submitted to the Commission's Executive Director for her review, unless any interested person or his or her duly authorized representative requests, no later than 15 days prior to the close of the written comment period, a public hearing before the full Commission. If a public hearing is requested, the proposed code(s) will be submitted to the Commission for review.

The Executive Director of the Commission will review the above-referenced conflict-of-interest code(s), proposed pursuant to Government Code Section 87300, which designate, pursuant to Government Code Section 87302, employees who must disclose certain investments, interests in real property and income.

The Executive Director of the Commission, upon her or its own motion or at the request of any interested person, will approve, or revise and approve, or return the proposed code(s) to the agency for revision and re-submission within 60 days without further notice.

Any interested person may present statements, arguments or comments, in writing to the Executive Director of the Commission, relative to review of the proposed conflict-of-interest code(s). Any written comments must be received no later than September 3, 2018. If a public hearing is to be held, oral comments may be presented to the Commission at the hearing.

COST TO LOCAL AGENCIES

There shall be no reimbursement for any new or increased costs to local government which may result from compliance with these codes because these are not new programs mandated on local agencies by the codes since the requirements described herein were mandated by the Political Reform Act of 1974. Therefore, they are not "costs mandated by the state" as defined in Government Code Section 17514.

EFFECT ON HOUSING COSTS AND BUSINESSES

Compliance with the codes has no potential effect on housing costs or on private persons, businesses or small businesses.

AUTHORITY

Government Code Sections 82011, 87303 and 87304 provide that the Fair Political Practices Commission as the code-reviewing body for the above conflict-of-interest codes shall approve codes as submitted, revise the proposed code and approve it as revised, or return the proposed code for revision and re-submission.

REFERENCE

Government Code Sections 87300 and 87306 provide that agencies shall adopt and promulgate conflict-of-interest codes pursuant to the Political Reform Act and amend their codes when change is necessitated by changed circumstances.

TRANS-1,2-DICHLOROETHYLENE IN
DRINKING WATER**

The Office of Environmental Health Hazard Assessment (OEHHA) of the California Environmental Protection Agency is announcing the publication of updated Public Health Goals (PHGs) for cis- and trans-1,2-dichloroethylene (cis-/trans-1,2-DCE) in drinking water. A PHG is the level of a drinking water contaminant at which adverse health effects are not expected to occur from a lifetime of exposure. The California Safe Drinking Water Act of 1996¹ requires OEHHA to develop PHGs based exclusively on public health considerations.² PHGs published by OEHHA are considered by the State Water Resources Control Board in setting drinking water standards (Maximum Contaminant Levels, or MCLs) for California.³

The technical support document, posted on the OEHHA website (<http://www.oehha.ca.gov>), presents an update of the cis- and trans-1,2-DCE PHGs. The updated PHGs are 13 parts per billion (ppb) for cis-1,2-DCE based on kidney effects and 50 ppb for trans-1,2-DCE based on immune system effects.

A companion document, also available at <http://www.oehha.ca.gov>, contains responses to public comments received during two public comment periods that ended in September 2017 and July 2018, and comments received in January 2018 from an external scientific peer review. OEHHA has evaluated all of the comments and revised the technical support document as appropriate.

Emergency Rulemaking to Facilitate Post-Fire Recovery Efforts Within the Counties of Napa, Sonoma and Mendocino

In this emergency readopt rulemaking, the Board of Forestry and Fire Protection (the "Board") is providing an exemption from the plan preparation and submission requirements and from the completion report and stocking report requirements of the Z'berg-Nejedly Forest Practice Act of 1973 (Public Resources Code section 4511, et seq.) (the "Act") to persons engaging in specified forest management activities. This exemption includes cutting or removing dead or dying trees when the trees are within 300 feet of an Approved and Legally Permitted Structure that was damaged or destroyed by wildfire during the October 2017 Northern California wildfires in Mendocino, Napa, and Sonoma Counties.
