**PROPOSED ACTION ON REGULATIONS**

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**TITLE 2. FAIR POLITICAL PRACTICES COMMISSION**

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that the Fair Political Practices Commission, pursuant to the authority vested in it by Sections 82011, 87303, and 87304 of the Government Code to review proposed conflict-of-interest codes, will review the proposed/amended conflict-of-interest codes of the following:

CONFLICT-OF-INTEREST CODES

AMENDMENT

- MULTI-COUNTY: Cabrillo Community College District  
 Local Agency Workers' Compensation Excess Joint Powers Authority  
 Colusa Sutter Yolo Regional Child Support Agency  
 Petaluma Schools
- STATE AGENCY: Department of General Services

A written comment period has been established commencing on February 21, 2025, and closing on April 7, 2025. Written comments should be directed to the Fair Political Practices Commission, Attention Belen Cisneros, 1102 Q Street, Suite 3050, Sacramento, California 95811.

At the end of the 45-day comment period, the proposed conflict-of-interest codes will be submitted to the Commission's Executive Director for their review, unless any interested person or their duly authorized representative requests, no later than 15 days prior to the close of the written comment period, a public hearing before the full Commission. If a public hearing is requested, the proposed codes will be submitted to the Commission for review.

The Executive Director of the Commission will review the above-referenced conflict-of-interest codes, proposed pursuant to Government Code Section 87300, which designate, pursuant to Government Code Section 87302, employees who must disclose

certain investments, interests in real property and income.

The Executive Director of the Commission, upon their own motion or at the request of any interested person, will approve, or revise and approve, or return the proposed codes to the agency for revision and re-submission within 60 days without further notice.

Any interested person may present statements, arguments, or comments, in writing to the Executive Director of the Commission, relative to review of the proposed conflict-of-interest codes. Any written comments must be received no later than April 7, 2025. If a public hearing is to be held, oral comments may be presented to the Commission at the hearing.

COST TO LOCAL AGENCIES

There shall be no reimbursement for any new or increased costs to local government which may result from compliance with these codes because these are not new programs mandated on local agencies by the codes since the requirements described herein were mandated by the Political Reform Act of 1974. Therefore, they are not "costs mandated by the state" as defined in Government Code Section 17514.

EFFECT ON HOUSING COSTS AND BUSINESSES

Compliance with the codes has no potential effect on housing costs or on private persons, businesses, or small businesses.

AUTHORITY

Government Code Sections 82011, 87303 and 87304 provide that the Fair Political Practices Commission as the code-reviewing body for the above conflict-of-interest codes shall approve codes as submitted, revise the proposed code, and approve it as revised, or return the proposed code for revision and re-submission.

REFERENCE

Government Code Sections 87300 and 87306 provide that agencies shall adopt and promulgate conflict-of-interest codes pursuant to the Political Reform Act and amend their codes when change is necessitated by changed circumstances.

AUTHORITY AND REFERENCE

**Government Code Section 12838.5** provides that commencing July 1, 2005, CDCR succeeds to, and is vested with, all the powers, functions, duties, responsibilities, obligations, liabilities, and jurisdiction of abolished predecessor entities, such as Department of Corrections, Department of the Youth Authority, and Board of Corrections.

**Penal Code (PC) Section 5000** provides that commencing July 1, 2005, any reference to Department of Corrections in this or any code, refers to the CDCR, Division of Adult Operations. **PC Section 5050** provides that commencing July 1, 2005, any reference to the Director of Corrections in this or any other code, refers to the Secretary of the CDCR. As of that date, the office of the Director of Corrections is abolished.

**PC Section 5054** provides that commencing July 1, 2005, the supervision, management, and control of the State prisons, and the responsibility for the care, custody, treatment, training, discipline, and employment of persons confined therein are vested in the Secretary of the CDCR. **PC Section 5055** provides that commencing July 1, 2005, all powers and duties previously granted to and imposed upon the Department of Corrections shall be exercised by the Secretary of the CDCR. **PC Section 5058** authorizes the Director to prescribe and amend rules and regulations for the administration of prisons and for the administration of the parole of persons. **PC Section 5058.3** authorizes the Director to certify in a written statement filed with Office of Administrative Law that operational needs of the department require adoption, amendment, or repeal of regulation on an emergency basis.

INFORMATIVE DIGEST/POLICY  
STATEMENT OVERVIEW

The proposed regulations comply with Assembly Bill (AB) 3043 regarding confidential calls, establish the procedures for when an incarcerated person intentionally damages or destroys an authorized wireless communication device, such as a tablet or kiosk, and the department’s requirements of incarcerated person–use of these devices.

**This action will:**

- Establish consistency and standardization of allowable personal property for all persons employed by the department, employees of other government agencies, contract employees, contractors and their employees, volunteers, and attorneys or legal organizations as identified in Title 15, section 3141(c)(10).
- Permit Department employees to register their personal wireless communication devices, such as their personal cellular phones and wearable technology in an online mode capable of communication, within the secure perimeter of institutions.
- Incorporate by reference new CDCR Form 2056, Personal Wireless Communication Device Registration and Authorization Form.

SPECIFIC BENEFITS ANTICIPATED BY  
THE PROPOSED REGULATIONS

Proposed regulations authorize employees of the department, employees of other government agencies, contract employees, contractors and their employees, volunteers, and attorneys or legal organizations as identified in Title 15, section 3141(c)(10) to bring allowable items into department properties located within a secure perimeter. These regulations also aid in minimizing the introduction of prohibited contraband into these properties, increasing the safety of incarcerated persons and staff.

EVALUATION OF INCONSISTENCY/  
INCOMPATIBILITY WITH  
EXISTING REGULATIONS

Pursuant to Government Code 11346.5(a)(3)(D), the department has determined the proposed regulations are not inconsistent or incompatible with existing reg-

ulations. After conducting a review for any regulations that would relate to or affect this area, the department has concluded that these are the only regulations that allowable property for department employees, employees of other government agencies, contract employees, contractors and their employees, volunteers, and attorneys or legal organizations as identified in Title 15, section 3141(c)(10).

LOCAL MANDATES

This action imposes no mandates on local agencies or school districts, or a mandate, which requires reimbursement of costs or savings pursuant to Government Code Sections 17500–17630.

The department has made an initial determination that the proposed action will have no significant effect on housing costs.

PRIVATE PERSONS OR BUSINESSES

The department is not aware of any cost impacts that a representative private person or business would necessarily incur in reasonable compliance with the proposed action.

SIGNIFICANT STATEWIDE ADVERSE  
ECONOMIC IMPACT ON BUSINESS

The department has made an initial determination that this action will not have a significant statewide adverse economic impact on business, including the ability of California businesses to compete with businesses in other states because the proposed regulations affect the internal management of CDCR only, and place no requirements or restrictions on businesses.

EFFECT ON SMALL BUSINESSES

The department has determined that the proposed regulations will not affect small businesses. This action has no significant adverse economic impact on

small businesses because they place no obligations or requirements on any business.

**RESULTS OF THE ECONOMIC  
IMPACT ASSESSMENT**

CDCR has determined that this regulatory proposal will not have any impact on the following:

- 1) Creation or elimination of jobs within California,
- 2) Creation of new businesses or elimination of existing businesses within California,
- 3) Expansion of businesses currently doing business with the state.

The department has determined that the proposed regulations will have no impact on the health and welfare of California residents, or the State's environment. These regulations may enhance workers' and incarcerated population safety by preventing the introduction of contraband into department facilities with a secure perimeter. Additionally, allowing department employees to bring in wearable technology and personal cellular phones encourages the benefits of the use of fitness and health monitors that are incorporated in these devices in efforts to incorporate long-term health and wellness choices into their daily routine, and allows department employees to stay in contact with their families.

**CONSIDERATION OF ALTERNATIVES**

The department must determine that no reasonable alternative considered by the department or that has otherwise been identified and brought to the attention of the department would be more effective in carrying out the purpose for which the action is proposed, would be as effective and less burdensome to affected private persons than the proposed regulatory action, or would be more cost-effective to affected private persons and equally effective in implementing the statutory policy or other provisions of law. Interested persons are invited to present statements or arguments with respect to any alternatives to the changes proposed at the scheduled hearing or during the written comment period.

The department has prepared and will make available the text and the Initial Statement of Reasons (ISOR) of the proposed regulations. If the department makes modifications which are sufficiently related to the originally proposed text, it will make the modified text, with the changes clearly indicated, available to the public for at least 15 days before the department adopts, amends or repeals the regulations as revised. The department will accept written comments on the modified regulations for at least 15 days after the date on which they are made available.

**TITLE 16. BOARD OF PHARMACY**

**AUTOMATED PATIENT DISPENSING  
SYSTEMS CONSULTATION**

**NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN** that the California State Board of Pharmacy (Board) proposes taking the rulemaking action described below under the heading Informative Digest/Policy Statement Overview, after considering all comments, objections, and recommendations regarding the proposed action.

**PUBLIC HEARING**

The Board has not scheduled a public hearing on this proposed action. However, the Board will hold a hearing if it receives a written request for a public hearing from any interested person, or that person's authorized representative, no later than 15 days prior to the close of the written comment period. A hearing may be requested by making such request in writing addressed to the individuals listed under "Contact Persons" in this notice.

**WRITTEN COMMENT PERIOD**

Written comments relevant to the action proposed, including those sent by mail, facsimile, or email to the

addresses listed under “Contact Person” in this Notice, must be received by the Board at its office no later than April 7, 2025, or must be received by the Board at the hearing, should one be scheduled.

*Authority and Reference:* Pursuant to the authority vested by Business and Professions Code (BPC) sections 4005 and 4075, the Board proposes amending section 1713 of Division 17 of Title 16 of the California Code of Regulations (CCR).

### INFORMATIVE DIGEST/POLICY STATEMENT OVERVIEW

The Board is a state agency vested with the authority to license and regulate the pharmacy industry, including pharmacies, pharmacists, and pharmacy technicians (BPC section 4000, et seq.). The Board’s mandate and mission are to protect the public (BPC section 4001.1).

BPC sections 4427 through 4427.7 generally establish the requirements for the use of automated drug delivery systems (ADDS) in California. BPC section 4427.6 generally establishes the requirements for the use of automated patient dispensing systems (APDS). Specifically, subdivision (f) provides that all prescribed drugs and devices dispensed to a patient from an APDS for the first time shall be accompanied by a consultation conducted by a pharmacist licensed by the board via a telecommunications link that has two-way audio and video.

Existing regulation at Title 16, CCR section 1713(d) provides authority for a pharmacy to use an APDS to deliver prescription medications to patients under specified conditions, including that the pharmacy provides an immediate consultation with a pharmacist, either in-person or via telephone, upon the request of the patient; however, existing regulation conflicts with statute. To address the conflict and ensure licensees understand the consultation requirements for first-time dispenses from an APDS, the proposed regulation mirrors the statutory language in BPC section 4427.6, requiring consultation with a Board-licensed pharmacist via a telecommunications link with two-way audio and video when prescription drugs and devices are dispensed to a patient from an APDS for the first time.

### ANTICIPATED BENEFITS OF PROPOSAL

Protection of the public is the Board’s highest priority in exercising its licensing, regulatory, and disciplinary functions. The Board has determined that this regulatory proposal will benefit the health and welfare of California residents because the proposal removes a conflict between statutory requirements and existing regulations. The proposal will also benefit the health

and welfare of California residents by ensuring access to a consultation with a licensed pharmacist via audio and video telecommunication when prescription drugs and devices are dispensed to a patient from an APDS for the first time.

This regulatory proposal does not affect employee safety or the state’s environment.

### EVALUATION OF CONSISTENCY AND COMPATIBILITY WITH EXISTING STATE REGULATIONS

During the development of this regulatory proposal, the Board searched for similar regulations on this topic and concluded that these regulations are neither inconsistent nor incompatible with existing state regulations.

### DISCLOSURES REGARDING THIS PROPOSED ACTION

#### FISCAL IMPACT ESTIMATES

***Fiscal Impact on Public Agencies Including Costs/Savings to State Agencies or Costs/Savings in Federal Funding to the State:*** The regulations do not result in a fiscal impact to the state.

The regulations do not result in a fiscal impact to the state in the form of federal funding or any cost or savings to any state agency.

***Nondiscretionary Costs/Savings to Local Agencies:*** None.

***Cost to any Local Agency or School District for which Government Code Sections 17500–17630 Require Reimbursement:*** None.

***Mandate Imposed on Local Agencies or School Districts:*** None.

***Significant Effect on Housing Costs:*** None.

#### BUSINESS IMPACT ESTIMATES

The Board has made an initial determination that the proposed regulatory action would have no significant statewide adverse economic impact directly affecting business, including the ability of California businesses to compete with businesses in other states.

The proposed amendment clarifies the requirements for using a two-way telecommunications (audio and video) link to provide patient consultation with a Board-licensed pharmacist when prescription medication is dispensed from an automated patient delivery system to a patient for the first time, as required by BPC section 4427.6. This proposed amendment will remove the conflict between statute and regulation,

which will benefit businesses that utilize an APDS and will not have an adverse effect on businesses.

***Cost Impact on Representative Private Person or Business:***

The Board is not aware of any negative cost impacts that a representative private person or business would necessarily incur in reasonable compliance with the proposed action.

**RESULTS OF ECONOMIC IMPACT  
ASSESSMENT/ANALYSIS:**

*Impact on Jobs/New Businesses:*

The Board has determined that this regulatory proposal will not:

- (1) create jobs within California;
- (2) eliminate jobs within California;
- (3) create new businesses within California;
- (4) eliminate existing businesses within California, and;
- (5) expand businesses currently doing business in the State of California.

The Board determined that this proposal will not create or eliminate jobs or businesses. The proposal removes a conflict between statutory requirements and existing regulations. The proposal will also benefit the health and welfare of California residents by ensuring access to a consultation with a licensed pharmacist via audio and video telecommunication when prescription drugs and devices are dispensed to a patient from an APDS for the first time.

This regulatory proposal does not affect employee safety or the state’s environment.

**BUSINESS REPORTING REQUIREMENTS**

This regulatory proposal does not require businesses to file a report with the Board.

**EFFECT ON SMALL BUSINESS**

The Board has determined that the proposed regulatory action may affect small businesses, as defined in Government Code section 11342.610. The proposed regulation text removes a conflict between the regulatory text and the requirements in BPC section 4427.6, which requires consultation with a Board–licensed pharmacist via a telecommunications link that has two–way audio and video when prescription drugs and devices are dispensed to a patient from an APDS for the first time.

**CONSIDERATION OF ALTERNATIVES**

In accordance with Government Code section 11346.5(a)(13), the Board has determined that no rea-

sonable alternative it considered to the regulation, or that has otherwise been identified and brought to its attention, would be more effective in carrying out the purpose for which the action is proposed, would be as effective and less burdensome to affected private persons than the proposal described in this Notice, or more would be more cost–effective to affected private persons and equally effective in implementing the statutory policy or other provision of law.

Any interested person may submit comments — relevant to the above determinations — in writing, at the address listed below for the *Contact Persons*, during the written comment period, or at the hearing if one is scheduled or requested.

COUNTIES OF ALAMEDA AND  
CONTRA COSTA

The Department of Fish and Wildlife (CDFW) received a proposal on January 30, 2025, from East Bay Regional Park District (EBRPD) requesting authorization to take the salt–marsh harvest mouse (*Reithrodontomys raviventris*), a fully protected mammal, California Ridgway’s rail (*Rallus obsoletus obsoletus*), a fully protected bird, California black rail (*Laterallus jamaicensis coturniculus*), a fully protected bird, and California least tern (*Sternula antillarum browni*), a fully protected bird, in an effort to recover fully protected, threatened, or endangered species on EBRPD lands. Salt–marsh harvest mouse are also listed as endangered under the California Endangered Species Act and listed as endangered under the federal Endangered Species Act; California Ridgway’s rail are also listed as endangered under the California Endangered Species Act and listed as endangered under the federal Endangered Species Act; California black rail are also listed as threatened under the California Endangered Species Act; and California least tern are also listed as endangered under the California Endangered Species Act and listed as endangered under the federal Endangered Species Act.

EBRPD proposes to conduct beneficial restoration and management activities on multiple properties throughout the park district over ten years (Program) expected to contribute to recovery of fully protected, threatened, or endangered species, including work in streams, lakes, ponds, wetlands, and uplands. Proposed Program activities will include, but are not limited to, the installation of in–stream structures to stabilize and protect degraded streambanks; control and removal of invasive or noxious weeds; culvert repair, replacement, and maintenance; removal of sediment

or debris from culverts and streams; maintenance dredging of silt basins; installation and maintenance of stream crossings and fords; bank and levee stabilization; installation and maintenance of bridges; removal of hazardous structures; maintenance dredging of ponds and lakes; maintenance and redevelopment of spring boxes; and tidal marsh restoration. The Program will occur within 74 regional parks in Alameda and Contra Costa counties that EBRPD manages, which has a total size of 122,890 acres. CDFW intends to issue, under specified conditions, a Permit for Recovery and Management (PRAM) to authorize EBRPD to carry out the proposed Program. Pursuant to California Fish and Game Code section 3511 and 4700, take authorized for any fully protected species shall only be associated with work expected to contribute to recovery of one or more fully protected, threatened, or endangered species, as determined by CDFW on a case-by-case basis when approving proposed sub-projects to be covered under the Program.

Pursuant to California Fish and Game Code section 3511 and 4700, CDFW may authorize take of fully protected birds and mammals after 30 days' notice has been provided to affected and interested parties through publication of this notice. If CDFW determines that the proposed Program is consistent with the requirements of Section 3511 and 4700 for take of fully protected birds and mammals, it may issue the authorization in the form of a PRAM on or after March 23, 2025 for an initial and extendable term of 10 years.
